• The **methods** used to record included collecting relevant imagery, taking photographs and sketching from objects and images. Further sketching, printmaking and perhaps tracing over photographs may have helped to further explore the idea of line drawing.

Theme: Just in time

Mark awarded = 32 out of 100

- The submission demonstrates some **exploration** with media and a sense of inventiveness with the use of baking equipment as used to create printed marks upon the page.
- A range of relevant materials and processes have been **selected** including photography, pen work, printing and painting. The level of control achieved with each of these is inconsistent. For example, working with paint shows a lack of understanding of form and depth. The text on the containers does not follow the contours of the packaging, colour mixing is muddy and the general result is flat.
- Despite the weakness of **technical skill** in some areas, there are also some examples of visual understanding. The composition of the final outcome is dynamic and fills the page in an interesting way. The fusion with the printed equipment bases and printed text links the work to the supporting studies and visually enhances the image.
- The intention to focus on illustrative line work has been left behind and so links with the supporting work and artist research become less obvious.

AO3: Develop ideas through investigation, demonstrating critical understanding Satisfactory development

Satisfactory development of ideas through investigation, demonstrating some understanding

- Some attempt to show **purposeful** development is evident. The connection with the contextual source shows how this influence guides the progression of the work to some degree. The images made by printing with the bases of equipment and overlaid with line drawing using black pen connect to artist research and the candidate's own intentions.
- There is a jump between these initial **explorations** and the final idea. Although it appears that the candidate's intention to depict baking from the outset, vital stages of planning are missing. This demonstrates that imagery has not fully evolved from the initial research and creates a disconnect between the **supporting work** and the final outcome.
- An **alternative** idea did evolve, as seen by the pre-final. This combines the recipe idea with the cake mixture and ingredients. Alternative compositions and viewpoints were not explored. This indicates a lack of **reflection**, conscious decision making and an ability to evaluate work as it is created.

- The **final outcome** links to the supporting work both by theme and intention but it is not resolved or progressed in any depth from development. The candidate intended to depict three stages of baking a cake, as explained by annotation. They fulfilled two parts of this plan but more importantly, missed out vital stages of information gathering, skill refinement and evidence of them realising their intentions.
- The creative journey is apparent, but work presented does not demonstrate integral stages of planning and evaluation.

Theme: Just in time

Mark awarded = 32 out of 100

- Understanding of the visual elements could have been honed by further observational study of each of the intended components depicted in the final outcome. For example, the cake mixture, pouring out of the mixing bowl and the packets of flour and baking powder seen in the background.
- Critical decisions were not fully explored. How the printed element with text included would be combined with the painted element of the image, was not thoroughly explored. Alternative compositions and scale could have been practised in order to best **communicate** intentions.
- Some evidence of **analysis** was seen in the planning stage but this along with **reflection** and **evaluation** were not evident in the latter stages of the project.
