- 1 Describe the way in which Germany lost land in the Treaty of Versailles. Explain why the Germans did **not** want to sign the Treaty.
- 2 Describe the work of the agencies of the League of Nations. Explain why the League failed to stop the Italian invasion of Abyssinia.
- 3 Describe the decisions made about Germany at the Yalta and Potsdam conferences. Explain why the Soviet Union took control of territories in eastern Europe in the years up to 1948.
- **4** Describe the strengths and weaknesses of the United Nations. Explain why the UN had some success in dealing with the Congo Crisis (1960–64).

### **Section B: History of Mauritius**

#### 1 Ile de France 1715 to 1810

- **5** Describe the work of Cossigny in the IIe de France in the years 1732–35. Explain why Labourdonnais was successful as governor of the IIe de France.
- **6** Describe the effects of the Seven Years' War on the IIe de France. Explain why Pierre Poivre was important in the history of the island.
- **7** Describe how the corsairs helped protect the IIe de France at the end of the eighteenth century. Explain why the French Revolution of 1789 had a limited impact on the island.
- **8** Describe how the IIe de France became a British possession in 1810. Explain why Decaen was a successful captain-general in the years 1803–10.

#### 2 British Mauritius from 1810 to 1922

- **9** Describe how the sugar industry grew in Mauritius in the years 1810–60. Explain the reasons for this growth.
- **10** Describe the problems faced by Port Louis in the years 1810–69. Explain why the British found it difficult to overcome these difficulties.
- **11** Describe the work of Adolphe de Plevitz in Mauritius. Explain why the recommendations of the Royal Commission of 1872 were **not** carried out.
- 12 Describe the disagreements between the Oligarchs and Democrats in the early years of the twentieth century. Explain why Manilal Maganlal Doctor is important in the history of Mauritius.
