Generic Marking Principles

These general marking principles must be applied by all examiners when marking candidate answers. They should be applied alongside the specific content of the mark scheme or generic level descriptions for a question. Each question paper and mark scheme will also comply with these marking principles.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 1:

Marks must be awarded in line with:

- the specific content of the mark scheme or the generic level descriptors for the question
- the specific skills defined in the mark scheme or in the generic level descriptors for the question
- the standard of response required by a candidate as exemplified by the standardisation scripts.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 2:

Marks awarded are always whole marks (not half marks, or other fractions).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 3:

Marks must be awarded **positively**:

- marks are awarded for correct/valid answers, as defined in the mark scheme. However, credit is given for valid answers which go beyond the scope of the syllabus and mark scheme, referring to your Team Leader as appropriate
- marks are awarded when candidates clearly demonstrate what they know and can do
- marks are not deducted for errors
- marks are not deducted for omissions
- answers should only be judged on the quality of spelling, punctuation and grammar when these features are specifically assessed by the question as indicated by the mark scheme. The meaning, however, should be unambiguous.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 4:

Rules must be applied consistently, e.g. in situations where candidates have not followed instructions or in the application of generic level descriptors.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 5:

Marks should be awarded using the full range of marks defined in the mark scheme for the question (however; the use of the full mark range may be limited according to the quality of the candidate responses seen).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 6:

Marks awarded are based solely on the requirements as defined in the mark scheme. Marks should not be awarded with grade thresholds or grade descriptors in mind.

1(a)	 Credit any of the following points or any other valid points. Eriq wants to take immediate action (to reverse the worrying trend of falling behind his main competitor in terms of overall sales)/Finn is immediately available. Finn has no sponsorship deal at present/so he would be available immediately for promotional work. Gaele pointed out that EE could be in from the beginning as Finn is about to go global/which might mean increased exposure of Eckdorf's products. Finn and Gaele are happy to accept \$5m per year/which would be less than the \$20 m over three years that Eriq had in mind/less than Eriq wants to pay. Gaele may negotiate less than a three-year deal/so Eriq would not be stuck with a sponsorship deal that might not be working out for the usual three years Eckdorf Elite sponsors someone. Gaele's agency is flexible/offers a personalized service/so Eriq might think he could get a better deal for EE while sponsoring Finn/have a better relationship with the agency/Eriq might think that EE would get Finn cheaply. The news report suggests that Gaele was telling the truth about global recognition/as the reporter also thought Finn would be likely to perform very well at the Olympic Games His coach has trained a bronze medal winner/so Finn could be the first person to win an Olympic gold medal for Pomforin/which would reflect positively on EE. Athletics is the second most 'participated in' sport in Pomforin/so Finn would appeal to a significant number of people already. Finn lives and trains in the south-west suburbs of Riin/so it would be easy for him to visit the offices/have face-to-face meetings with him/carry out his media responsibilities.

	 Credit any of the following points or any other valid point. Bruno, her agent, said that she was so recognised around the world (1) that she would be a very marketable commodity (1) Ina is an international-level golfer/in the world's top 100 (1)/so Eriq might think that if she were to be the face of Eckdorf Elite, sales should increase. (1) Eriq might feel pressurised into sponsoring her by (1) Bruno telling him that other sportswear companies were rushing to sign her. (1) Golf is easily the second most watched sport in Pomforin, (1) so nearly ten million viewers would be exposed to Eckdorf Elite's branding on Ina's sportswear and equipment. (1) Eckdorf Elite makes the most profit per item on the sales of its sets of golf clubs and replacement golf clubs, (1) so it would make financial sense to sponsor a golf player as the face of the company, (1) especially as sales of its golf clothing and equipment have fallen sharply in the past year. Do not refer to Finn Mayore Credit any of the following points or any other valid point. Ina has recently been treated for a serious back injury (1) so there could be doubts over Ina's future fitness/ability to play/promote EE (1) Ina's caddie was about to retire and she has not found a replacement (1) which might impact negatively on her performance/reflect badly on EE (1). 	4
1(d)	 In your opinion, explain the real reason why, in relation to his company, Bruno told Eriq and Sirie that other companies were rushing to sign Ina so they would need to be quick about agreeing to his terms. Credit any two points below or any other valid point. Bruno was intent on getting \$30m over three years as his 20% share would cover his agency's debts. (1) It was likely that he would need this money quickly as the debts would be accruing interest and/or increasing (1) he thought that getting them to accept his terms without lengthy haggling/on the spot was the best way to achieve this amount.
